


riendship No one needs to tell a Burnet High School student that his school is synonymous with the word "friendliness", because we feel that it has always held this ideal.

Dorothy Dennis, interested in foreign language and science graduated with in 3 years.


Lenna Hahn has proved herself dependable, industrious, honest, and loyal to her school.




Reeves Jungkind gained the place as one of our football captians and played basketball.

The last change clarifies and strongthens the rule governing the use of the hands and arms in blocking.
