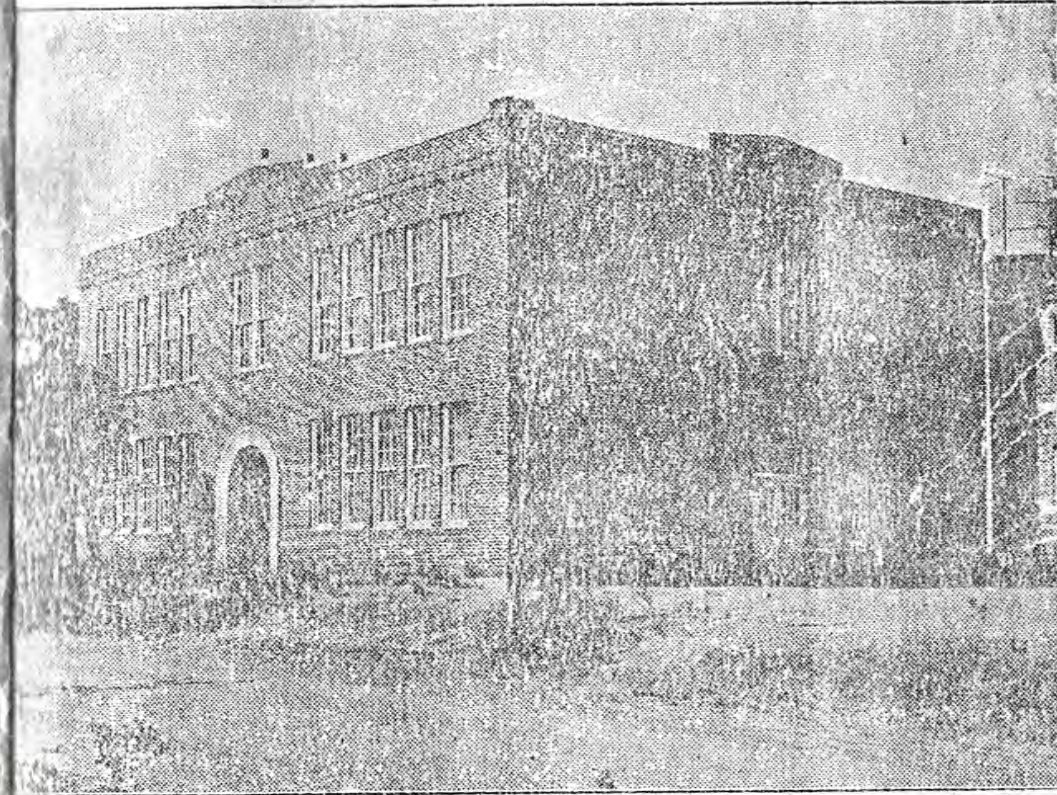

## THE BURNET SCHOOLS

The year 1936-37 has been outstanding in the history of the Burnet Schools in that the enrollment has far exceeded that of any previous year. The growth of the school can be somewhat understood by comparing a few figures concerning the enrollment during the past eight years. In 1929-30, before much construction work had been done on the then Hamilton Dam, the total enrollment in all grades was 232. In 1930-31 the enrollment showed some increase and reached 326. In 1931-32, when work on Hamilton Dam was at its peak the enrollment jumped to 414 which was a record attendance up to that time. The school was crowded that year and the school suffered some for lack of room and a shortage of teachers. When work on the dam ceased, the enrollment decreased for the year 1932-33, but never dropped to the 1931-32 level. The enrollment has had a gradual increase from 1932-33 until this year as may be shown by the following enrollment figures. In 1932-33 the enrollment was 333—1933-34, 351—1934-35, 372—1935-36, 405—and in 1936-37, 667. It may be seen that the enrollment has gradually increased from 1932-33 until by 1935-36 it had reached the peak set in 1931-32 when construction work was going on at Hamilton Dam. This year the enrollment has increased more than fifty per cent over the previous year which until this time showed the greatest enrollment of the schools history.

Using these figures as a basis for opinions, it is evident that the enrollment will be slightly decreased during 1937-38, but will not fall to the 1935-36 level. It may also be predicted that within five years the normal enrollment of this school will be greater than it is this year. This presents an important problem to the people of this community as the housing facilities are inadequate to efficiently take care of the present enrollment. Some of the pupils in school at present, will someday be faced with a building program. While this is a difficult problem, the citizens of the town both pupils and parents, should be proud of the fact for when the school ceases to grow the town has already reached its maximum growth unless something comes along to give it a boost.

Both teachers and pupils have been greatly handicapped this year and the pupils have been left to their own resources more than usual and possibly more than is best. The teachers throughout the system are to be commended for their willingness in assuming additional responsibilities, and in all cases the teacher pupil load is greater than that recommended by the State Department of Education.

The school is glad to have had the children of the workmen on Buchanan Dam with us this year and as some will not be here another year we extend to you best wishes as you leave and hope that your stay with us has been profitable.

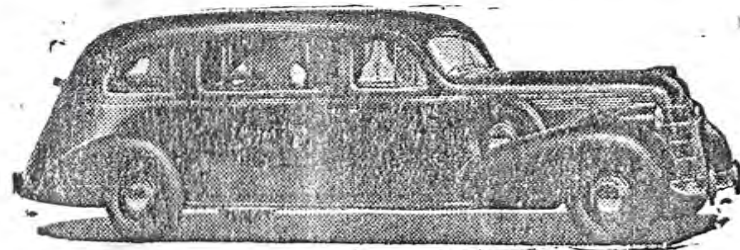
